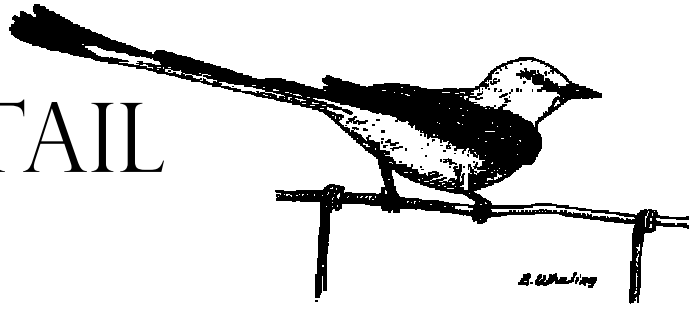

TogetherGreen Volunteer Days. I would like to announce that we were selected for a \$7000 TogetherGreen Volunteer Days grant through National Audubon. This grant provides funds to increase volunteerism in conservation projects. The TAS Board met several times and decided on seven projects. Watch www.tulsaaudubon.org for project details and opportunities to volunteer for fun and meaningful projects. Our goal is to involve at least 150 new volunteers in our projects.

Birding Etiquette

If you are new to bird watching or an old hand at it, there are a few things to remember while communing with nature:

- Be clear about time and place to meet.
- Be punctual. The group is waiting to leave and should not be expected to wait on stragglers. Most birds are seen early in the day and will be missed if time is taken to wait for latecomers. If you expect to be late, get the directions and proceed to the site. Get a cell number if possible.
- Shhh! Talking loudly and laughing will scare the birds away. This may seem obvious but it is the number one thing to remember while with a group. Wait until break time to visit with each other.
- Wear appropriate clothing. No one wants to watch you freeze, sweat, get wet or get sunburned.
- If going to a desolate place like Black Mesa, bring everything you need like food, enough gas and make room reservations if needed. Remember to bring cash as some remote places don't take credit cards.
- Break up a large group into manageable, smaller groups. Include an experienced birder in each group if possible to help the newer birders learn the different species.
- Have fun ! Respect nature, bring your bug spray, binocs, water and unbridled enthusiasm.

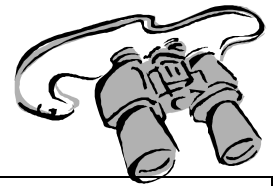

Record Your Sighting for the Record

The migration is almost upon us here in Oklahoma and I'm sure everyone will be out and about in their favorite spots. If that happens to be in the Tulsa County area in Northeast Oklahoma, the Tulsa Audubon Society would like for your sightings to become part of our historical records. They do not have to be rare or unusual, they all count.

We need the species and quantity of your avian sightings. "Many", "lots", or "several" won't "fly" and cannot be included. If there is a large flock, your best estimate would be appreciated. Next, we need the general area or location, i.e. Lake Yahola, Woodward Park, 31st & Riverside Drive, etc. We would prefer that you not give the exact address of a personal residence, just the neighborhood or street block. Finally, submit the names of the observers. Digital photos of all rare birds would be appreciated.

TAS records sightings from all of Tulsa County, a five mile buffer zone into all of the bordering counties, and Lake Keystone. If you are interested in supporting us in this endeavor, there are a couple of ways to report your findings. Send an email directly to the TAS Recorder at libitzki@juno.com or a post to OKBIRDS that includes all of the pertinent information. If you choose email, please include "bird report" or something similar in the subject so that I won't delete an unknown sender by accident.

Tulsa Audubon and *TogetherGreen*

Tulsa Audubon is one of about 60 Audubon entities chosen to participate in *TogetherGreen* which includes a grant to help fund program. The TAS Board has selected seven projects as our *TogetherGreen* commitment. Some of these are new projects and others are existing programs we will enhance through *TogetherGreen*:

Our First Event is Sunday, Oct. 12

***Sittin' Green Together* - Deep Fork NWR Habitat Improvement & Big Sit**

In conjunction with the Friends of the Deep Fork NWR we will be planting native wildflowers, doing trail maintenance, nature walks, and participating in a Big Sit bird count. Please join us for any part of the day, or all day! All volunteers will receive a Together Green/TAS T-Shirt and supper, provided the Friends of Deep Fork. For more information, contact Gail Storey at 918-742-2684.

5:30 a.m. to 5:30 - Big Sit A Big Sit is a bird count conducted entirely from a circle of about 17' in diameter. Birders sit in it all day and record everything that they see and hear. Teams will rotate in and out of the Big Sit circle. It will be down at the Cussetah Bottoms area where the Deep Fork board walk is located.

1:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. - Nature Walks Guided walks in the Cussetah Bottoms area

3:30 p.m. - 5:30 p.m. - Wildflower Planting, Trail Work, Cedar Removal Volunteers will be planting wildflowers, cleaning up the trails and removing cedars and other invasive plants (with loppers not chain saws!) Bring a shovel and gloves if you have them.

5:30 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. - Supper, provided by the Friends of Deep Fork Relax after a productive day on the refuge!

Dec. 13, Sat. Oxley Nature Center Habitat Improvement. 9:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. at the Oxley parking lot. Join us to help remove invasive species from Oxley's habitats, and perform other work to improve Oxley's trails and ecosystems. Lunch will be provided, and participants will receive a Together Green/TAS T-Shirt. For more information, contact John Kennington, 918-809-6325.

Jan. 3, Sat. Eagle Day Festival. This particular Eagle Day will be part of our *Together Green* program. Besides eagle viewing, we will feature multiple activities including children's and educational programs.

Jan. 31, Sat. Oxley Nature Center Bluebird Trail. 9:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. at the Oxley parking lot. Join us to help build and install a new Bluebird Trail at Oxley Nature Center, and perform other habitat improvements. Lunch will be provided, and participants will receive a Together Green/TAS T-Shirt.

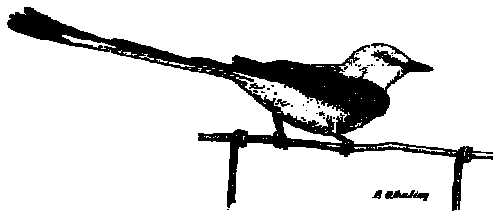
Apr. 18-19 Field Trip - Fence Marking at the Selman Ranch for Lesser Prairie-Chicken Protection. The Selman Ranch is located north of Woodward Oklahoma, and this event will be part of the Oklahoma Audubon Council's Lesser Prairie Chicken Festival that same weekend. This is rather far from Tulsa, but we anticipate a large contingent from Tulsa to participate. Fence marking is a very simple activity and is the most important action we can take to protect this species, which will likely be classified as an endangered species in the very near future.

Late March - Recycling/Sustainability Event. Exact date and details to be announced.

May 30-31 Sat.-Sun. Wildlife Habitat Garden Tour and Plant Sale. This is an existing event, and we plan to use the *TogetherGreen* program to greatly enhance it. We are still working out the details, but plan to offer new children's activities and educational opportunities at each home.

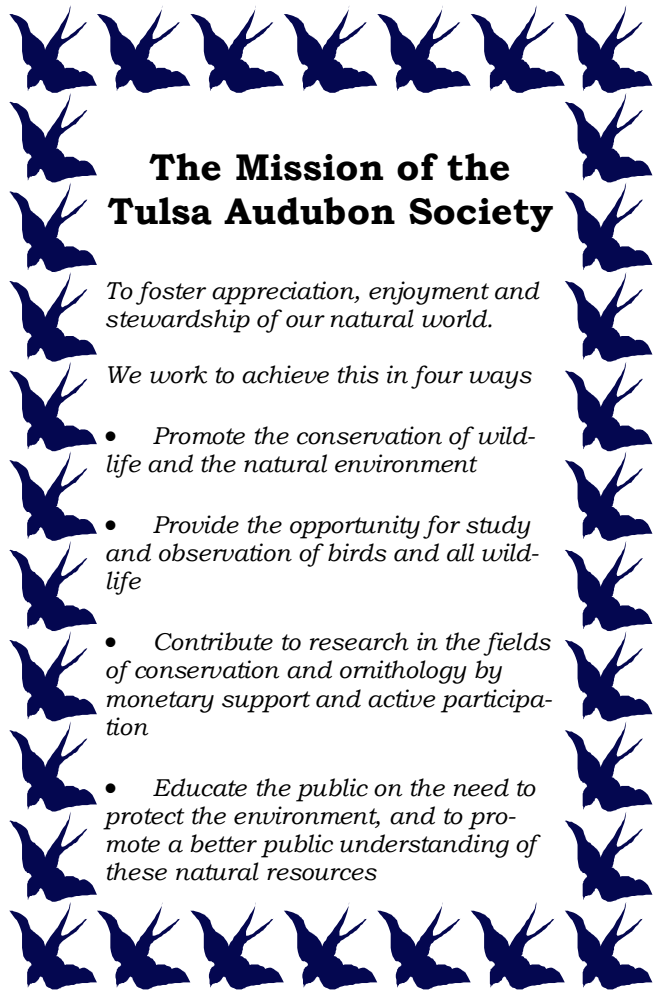
